The specs for the tablet are:

Android 4.4 Kit Kat OS, 1.2 GHz quad-core processor

WXGA Display (1280x800 Resolution)

32GB of extended memory available through a microSD slot (microSD card not included)

Comes with lots of free content and services

The tablet is on display at the General Meeting. Bring your dollars and get some tickets. This is the ideal size for easy carrying with a small screen that is large enough for good viewing. Connect to the Internet wherever you find free wi-fi connections.





Other tablet description includes:

The Tab 4's HEADPHONE jack sits up top, while the Micro-USB CHARGING PORT sits on the bottom. The physical HOME BUTTON is flanked on either side by the capacitive back and app-switcher buttons on the lower bezel. The LOCK SWITCH and VOLUME CONTROL ROCKER are on the right side, while the MICROSD CARD SLOT sits on the bottom right, hidden by a flap that's secure, but fairly easy to open when you need to. There's also an IR blaster on the side, so you can use the tablet as a remote control (with certain wireless devices).





The Education Corner



The summer classes are underway by the time you read this newsletter. We are only running three classes as we had to move a fourth class (Exploring the Internet) to July as we only had one student signed up for the class. We know there are people in our area (including some even in our own club) that are in need of an Internet class, but we just don't seem to be reaching them. So if you yourself or someone you know could use this class

where you learn all about navigating the Internet, let them know we are offering a class on Tuesdays and Thursdays in July from 12:00-2:00 starting July 7th.

We have a full class for the popular "Beyond the Basics: What's Next?". Many of those that are signed up have been taking the whole series of computer basic classes. They started with our "Computers for the Total Beginner", continued on with the "Everyday Computer Basics for Windows", and are wrapping things up with the current class. We will be offering the "Everyday Computer Basics for Windows" again in July, but there are only a few seats open for it.

Also in June we are offering a class on word processing. It's meeting on Mondays and Wednesdays from 12:00-2:00. This class is over half full with people wanting to know everything about creating different types of text files (such as documents, signs, flyers, and tri-folds), including graphics, and sending them out. This class will probably not be offered again until next year, so even if you missed the class on the 1st, you can still get in on the rest of the classes beginning on the 3rd. Then in July we are offering a class on creating and using spreadsheets (there's a lot more you can do with a spreadsheet like have it run math problems or create charts and graphs). Many of the people taking the word processing class are continuing on with the spreadsheet class. Even through it's over half full, there's still a few seats for anyone that wants to get in on the class (which may also not be offered until next year). It's also meeting on Mondays and Wednesdays from 12:00-2:00 starting July 6th.

Rounding out the July offerings will be another "Computers for the Total Beginners" class (which we had classes in both March and April due to such high demand) on Monday/Wednesday evenings from 6:00-8:00. We are also kicking around a class for those that are interested in learning about Bixler's Best Bet Commands", where those interested can learn some of Bixler's Best Bet commands to make your computer work so much easier.

If there are any other courses you might want to see offered, please let us know. If you have a number of friends wanting the class, we'll see about getting a teacher to help everyone learn all about it.

Linux SIG / Help Desk

The Linux group had another good set of meetings in May. The first meeting we worked on finishing up our "thumb drive project". We were creating a thumb drive that contained a portable version of VirtualBox which is a program that will allow you to run an operating system within your computer without installing it. Our goal was to create a Windows portable VirtualBox that would run LinuxMint (what's called a virtual machine). We are planning on being able to take this to a friend that's running Windows and be able to demonstrate Linux without having to reboot the computer to run a live disk. The Windows user just inserts

the thumb drive, starts up VirtualBox, and then selects the Linux OS. The program opens up and they can try out Linux without having to do anything to their computer. When they are done, they just shut down the OS, close VirtualBox, and remove the thumb drive (safetly of course). It's just that simple and easy to do. We did have to redo part of our project at the next meeting when we discovered that the virtual machine we used was a partial operating system and wouldn't run. We had accidently copied one that was created special for another project and not the full one we needed.

At the second meeting of our Help Desk, we did replace the partial OS with the one that was complete so we finally had a working thumb drive. The main part of this meeting dealt with a "how to" question from one of our members. He wanted to know how to convert some wma music files to mp3 so they could be transferred over to an mp3 player (which won't play wma files). Ken showed

us a real slick command line program that was easy to copy/paste to use. We were able to select the folder/album that had the songs we wanted converted and by running this command which was told to find all the .wma files (but using a wild card character) and re-save them as .mp3 files. We were able to watch the conversion take place and when we checked in the folder again, we found two sets of files, the original wma files and along side them were the new .mp3 files. The next step was to move out the new mp3 files to a new folder (again with a simple command using the same wildcard) so they could be uploaded to the mp3 player. We also found that one of our favorite media programs,

VLC, will play just about any kind of audio file whereas some of the audio programs will only play a certain type.

If you want to get in on the ground floor and learn about Linux, and how easy it is to use, and are reading this newsletter right when it comes out; we are having a beginner's class for Linux users on Tuesday and Thursdays from 3:00-5:00 the first three weeks in June. Even if you missed the class on the 2nd, come and we'll get you all caught up. We have a number of seats available for the class so come on down to the classroom and join us. You might like what you learn.




